Our independent association was founded in 2011. We organize, for example, readings with Holocaust survivors, provide information through websites of historical witnesses, present Israeli artists, visit exhibitions on Jewish history and maintain subject-specific collaborations.



FREUNDESKREIS BERLIN PANKOW – ASHKELON E.V. חברים ברלין פנקו-אשקלון



Ashkelon is a prosperous city in Israel. It is located south of Tel Aviv and north of Gaza on the Mediterranean coast. Ashkelon is home to slightly more than 134,000 inhabitants (2016) on an area of about 50 square kilometres.

At the beginning of the 1950s, the city was re-established in Israel. It has a marina and a long sandy beach. On the southern outskirts near the sea, an archaeological park with the ruins of ancient settlements can be found. Ashkelon has a long and rich history. Already in the Stone Age there was a port. In ancient times, Ashkelon was inhabited



by Canaanites, Philistines, Egyptians, Israelites, Assyrians, Babylonians, Greeks, Phoenicians, Hasmonidians, Romans, Persians, Arabs, Christian Crusaders and Malmuks.

Ashkelon Pankow

The district of Pankow is located in the north of Berlin, comprising 13 neighborhoods, including the eponymous Pankow, Blankenfelde, Karow, Prenzlauer Berg and Weißensee. More than





400,000 people live in this part of Berlin – more than in any other district of the German capital.

Pankow has a broad and rich Jewish history and presence. Having 1,200 seats in its prayer room, the Rykestraße Synagogue is the biggest synagogue in Germany. With almost 116,000 graves, the Jewish cemetery in Berlin-Weißensee is the largest existing Jewish cemetery in Europe by area. It is preserved as a site of historical interest.
